

Many of their classroom activities (like jelly making) began in the 1954 are now Berrybrook traditions incorporated into a curriculum supported by contemporary standards of best practice. Today, we have students whose parents were also students at Berrybrook! Children, parents, teachers and board members continue to be dedicated caretakers of Mrs. Mann's legacy and enjoy an early childhood experience that families have loved for 60 years. First Year Program

Our First Year students (2 Day and 3 Day) are learning how to say good-bye and are beginning to find ways to explore our environments. By October, many are very comfortable washing hands, making decisions, and playing near new friends.

During the year, we will observe several types of play in our First Year Classrooms. Most common is parallel play. Children engage in play near a classmate. They each may be doing their own thing, but the children would describe this as "playing with my friend".

Some children will be exploring group play. This type of play is characterized by mutual interactions and conversations, but children may still be working out how to play with their peers. There is much trial and error in these interactions, as children begin to negotiate with one another.

Cooperative Play occurs when children work together. All involved decide upon the theme of the play, and the play is very interactive. Children are working together, taking turns, and working toward a common goal. In essence, they are "all on the same page".

Berrybrook emergency evacuation drills started in September and will continue during the year. During our drills, teachers discuss the necessity of being able to get all children and teachers out of the school in case of an emergency. It is a good idea for families to talk about safety at home, and to agree on a safe meeting place. This month, children will have a visit from the Duxbury Fire Department and explore fire safety.

In addition to Fire Safety, we will be we will be discussing the changing of the seasons. Nature projects will be part of our days. We will be learning songs, hearing stories and playing games around these topics. October wraps up with a friendly celebration for Halloween. We will carve a class pumpkin and make a special snack in school. Because of severe food allergies, we ask that candy be enjoyed at home. This is especially important to remember after Halloween when children may want to bring candy to school in pockets or backpacks.

We look forward to getting to know you and your child as we venture together into this exciting school year. A year filled with learning and exploring while having fun!

Parent-Teacher Conferences

Berrybrook strives to provide a positive, nurturing and open environment for children, parents and staff. Day to day interactions provide an opportunity to address questions and concerns and starting later in October, parents of first year students will have the opportunity to schedule individual conference time with one of their child's teachers.

Conferences are an essential ingredient for quality early childhood education. They provide an opportunity for teachers and parents to discuss a child's progress, identify concerns and to set future goals. If possible, it's nice to have both parents attend and parents are encouraged to prepare in advance thoughts, questions or concerns.

Through open communication a strategy can be agreed upon. Children respond best when they receive similar responses in both their school and home environments. Teachers and parents should agree on a plan to follow-up on any school/home approach discussed at the conference. Parents and teachers work as a team - being open minded, respectful and honest while supporting each other for the benefit of the child.

Second Year Program

It takes time to get to know teachers and classmates and to adjust to a new routine. The Second Year Classes have been singing, building and creating all September long!

Singing takes time. We learn new songs, traditional Berrybrook songs and old favorites, along with some sign language. There is much pride in learning, practicing and coming together as a group to sing along with others. Ask your child to share with you some songs we've been singing together. Here is one that we've been practicing about a fish:

Little Fishy

Little Fishy went out to play,
He wiggled his fins and swam away.
Down he went in the water bright,
Opened his mouth and took a bite!
Mmm, Mmm, tastes good!

Building in the Block Area takes time. Friends work together to discuss which blocks they will use, where they will be placed, how to make the creation stable and sturdy and what it will be used for. Visit our class Shutterfly sites to see our block creations!

Creating takes time. Art projects come to life over a span of days. Projects in September pertained to sea life and involved watercolor, glue and paint. Art projects that have not come home in cubbies are displayed in the classroom. Please feel free to visit your child's classroom at Dismissal Time to see their displays.

Preparation takes time. Teachers gather materials for projects that relate to a child's experience. Where children live near the coast, one of the important and traditional Berrybrook Second Year art projects is a Quahog Garden. Quahogs, for years, have

been donated by Berrybrook families who have fun participating in Clam Digging. They are carefully selected for their purple coloring. The children learn that long, long ago, the Native People used the purple Quahog shell beads, called wampum, as money. Teachers order the beautiful purple Statice flowers and white Baby's Breath for the children to fill their Quahog and carefully create their garden. It takes time as they learn to place each flower where they choose, stem first, to create a unique display of color and nature.

In October, families will see and hear about more projects that children will take their time to carefully create. These will include their Halloween Scenes, "Pickles" the Fire Cat, props for telling the story of The Little Old Lady Who Wasn't Afraid of Anything and more. Families will also hear about the life cycle of pumpkins, another area of study in October.

To celebrate Halloween, children will be making their own individual pizzas. We ask that costumes remain at home for this special celebration.

Arrival & Dismissal

A helpful Berrybrook tradition has been for parents to meet another parent with younger children in the lot. One parent can watch younger children in the cars, while the other parent walks Berrybrook students to or from school. Please remember anytime you have an emergency or need help at arrival or dismissal, you may call the office and we will assist you!

So, feel free to encourage your children to "Say Hello to Mrs. Keeley" but please know that I do not consider it a requirement!

As I'm sure is the case in many households these days, the topic of Halloween costumes is at the forefront of our conversations with our kids. My children, who are 8, 6, and 3, have always been fairly easygoing about costumes; they will certainly come to decisions about what they'd like to be, but even just last year my middle daughter, Meredith, happily put on a hand me down costume from her sister from a few years before. Often times the decisions are made just the week before Halloween. This year, however, they mutually came to a firm decision one morning over breakfast.

"Mom!" they exclaimed, "We know what we should be for Halloween!" And they proceeded to wheel around the box of Rice Krispies, displaying Snap, a redhead, Crackle, a blonde, and Pop, a brunette, and declaring, "Look! They're just like us!" Ever since, they have been hounding me, almost daily, to hone my virtually non-existent DIY skills to get these costumes together for them.

I don't consider myself an overly ambitious or Pinterest-worthy mom; I save the important pieces of school artwork, I do what I can to throw together a periodic batch of homemade cookies, I try to take them to the library as often I can. But I'm in the same camp as everyone else- in an era where parents are constantly trying to put their best faces forward on social media, I'm tired and just doing my best to keep them fed and bathed and clothed. But something about their request for these costumes has me so proud and so eager to do my best for them; I might just actually take the plunge and get a sewing machine. Because anyone who has met my three children probably knows - they are all very different. They do their heavy share of arguing at home, and I struggle to not compare my two oldest, who are both girls, each and every day. The fact that they are a) excited to be a team for something like Halloween, b) acknowledging their obvious physical differences yet embracing them, and c) putting aside their nearly constant bickering to band together, is providing me with a true sense of joy.

My daughters have moved on from Berrybrook, but my youngest, Michael, has begun the 3-day program this fall. I'm thrilled that he gets to have the same experience that his sisters did by attending our wonderful school. But by no means do I think it will be an identical experience. Our teachers do their very best every day to get to know each individual child and what makes them tick. They understand that even siblings, while raised under the same roof, can have extremely different temperaments and motivations. I have always felt comfort knowing that my children's first real school setting has been here at Berrybrook, where everyone understands and respects their Snap, Crackle and Pop personalities.
